#### **Our Vision**

Prior to the introduction of FOGO bins, the contents of the average rubbish bin in Yarra Ranges was made up of 45% food waste.

By using your FOGO bin, food and garden waste can be used to create compost for gardens and farms. This reduces the amount of waste we send to landfill and lowers greenhouse emissions.



# Why Waste It?

A new Food Organics and Garden Organics (FOGO) collection will make it easier than ever to reduce waste and stop valuable material going to landfill.

From 2 October 2023, garden clippings and food scraps, including meat and bones, will go in your lime green lidded FOGO bin.

The bin will be collected weekly and turned into compost to help reduce the production of harmful greenhouse gases.

The change is part of the Victorian State Government's Circular Economy Policy. The policy aims to reduce waste going to landfill in Victoria by 2030.

We only get one planet, why waste it? Use the FOGO bin and play your part in reducing harmful greenhouse gases.

# From scraps to soil

Garden clippings and food scraps collected in FOGO bins will be taken to a composting facility, where it will be processed to create nutrient-rich material.

This compost will then be used to improve soil on farms and gardens. Some of this will help grow food, the scraps of which will become compost again through FOGO collections.

By using the new FOGO bin from October, we can keep food scraps out of landfill and send them to where they can be re-used.




The Food Organics and Garden Organics (FOGO) bin is for all your food and garden waste. The contents of this bin will be processed into compost that can be used in gardens and farms.

### Items that can go into your FOGO bin include:

- Council-provided compostable caddy liners that are bright green in colour and marked with the Australian Standard AS4736
- Food peelings, leftovers
- Human and pet hair
- Oisposable wooden cutlery, chopsticks and coffee stirrers
- Wooden items toothpicks, skewers, icy pole sticks
- Meat and bones (raw and cooked), eggs, dairy
- Seafood and soft shells (prawn, lobster)
- Bread, pasta, rice, cereal
- ✓ Loose tea leaves, coffee grounds
- Tissues, paper towel, paper napkins
- Newspaper (when used to line caddy)
- **Nuts, grains, seeds**
- Obesserts, pastries, cakes
- Leaves and grass clippings
- Small branches and logs (up to 10cm diameter and 40cm length)
- Sticks and twigs
- Weeds and flowers.

### Items that can't go into your FOGO bin include:

- Compostable liners that don't meet both the Australian Standard AS4736 and not bright green in colour
- Food packaging (including compostable/biodegradable packets), stickers, elastic bands, cling wrap
- X Plastic items and plastic bags
- Nappies and sanitary items and wipes, including those labelled as biodegradable or compostable
- (X) Animal waste and kitty litter
- X Textiles and fabric, including natural fibres
- Hard seafood shells, including oyster and clam shells
- X Liquids, including cooking oil and milk
- X Teabags, coffee pods
- Treated and painted timber
- X Ash, rocks, soil
- X Bricks and building materials
- (X) Metals and wire
- Garden items such as plant pots, gardening tools, garden hoses.



## **FOGO Tips and Tricks**

#### Using your FOGO kitchen caddy

- Place your FOGO bin out for collection WEEKLY on your nominated day.
- Place a Council-provided caddy liner into your kitchen caddy, or use paper towel, newspaper or no liner at all.
- Don't have a kitchen caddy? You can use any container, e.g. ice-cream tub.
- Keep your caddy in a handy location in your kitchen for easy access.
- Add your food waste to your caddy check the items with a green tick on page 4 for what you can put in.
- Every 2-3 days or when full, place the caddy contents into your lime-green lidded FOGO bin.
- Rinse your caddy and add a new liner. A sprinkle of bicarbonate soda will help to eliminate any odours.

# Tips for keeping your FOGO bin and kitchen caddy clean

- To reduce odours, wrap meat, fish and bones or store in a container, and place in freezer until bin collection day.
- Keep your FOGO bin in a shady location, particularly during summer.
- Rinse out your wheelie bin after collection. Use a broom to remove any waste stuck to the side or bottom.
- Use the Council-provided compostable liners, newspaper or paper towel to line your caddy before using it to collect food waste or wash after use.
- Avoid adding liquids to your caddy to prevent liners from breaking.

# Preparing for bushfire season? Don't burn it, BIN IT!

- Placing leaves, sticks and branches into your FOGO bin for collection each week will help to reduce bushfire fuel on your property and prepare for bushfire season.
- Using your FOGO bin each week is a great alternative to burning off, reducing smoke in your neighbourhood, and reusing the material to create compost.



### Items that can go into your recycling bin include:

- Cardboard, pizza boxes, cardboard takeaway containers, egg cartons
- Newspapers, magazines, paper, envelopes (including with windows)
- Plastic bottles (with lids), containers, trays, jars (Codes 1,2,5)
- Glass bottles, jars and lids
- Steel cans, empty aerosol cans, aluminium cans, clean aluminium foil (scrunched into a ball at least golf ball sized), pie trays
- Paint tins ensure they are dry and empty

These items may come from your kitchen (food packaging), bathroom (medicine bottles, makeup jars), laundry (cleaning product bottles) or shed (cardboard boxes, paint tins).

Please ensure that all items are emptied of their contents and placed loose into your bin, not in plastic bags.

### Items that can't go into your recycling bin include:

- Plastic bags, pouches and soft plastic wrapping
- X Food or garden waste
- (X) Waxed cardboard

- Anything with a plug, cord or battery
- ⊗ Batteries of any kind
- Nolystyrene, foam meat trays
- Rubbish, nappies
- X DVD/CD discs
- (X) Gas cylinders
- Printer cartridges
- X Coffee cups or lids
- Syringes
- Shredded paper



# Recycle your bottles and cans with the Container Deposit Scheme!

A Container Deposit Scheme begins in Victoria in November 2023. Return your drink containers to designated locations to receive a 10-cent refund. For more information, go to https://cdsvic.org.au/

Use your rubbish bin to dispose of materials that cannot be recycled or composted. Remember to bag or wrap all your rubbish. On collection day, do not put rubbish on top of or beside your bin and make sure you can close the bin lid.

### Items that can go into your rubbish bin include:

- Household waste
- **OPERATE** Polystyrene
- Plastic packaging including food wrappers, cling film
- Nappies and personal sanitary items
- Glassware, window glass, mirrors & pyrex
- ✓ Coffee cups and lids
- UHT/tetrapak containers e.g. milk, soup, iuice. small iuice boxes
- Animal waste and kitty litter.

### Items that can't go into your rubbish bin include:

- X Food and garden waste
- Anything with a plug, cord or battery
- Batteries
- Recyclables
- Bricks, building and renovation materials
- (X) Paint, pesticides, oils or solvents
- X Syringes and hazardous materials.

#### To help reduce your rubbish, try these tips:


- Choose reusable items over single-use ones.
- Purchase items with minimal packaging or in bulk.

• Repair, repurpose, donate or sell items.

# Do not overload your bin - the maximum weight trucks can collect is 75kg.

- Items in your rubbish bin must be bagged.
- Items in your recycling bin must be loose.
- Items in your FOGO bin can go in loose, wrapped in paper or bagged in the Council supplied caddy liners do not use any other type of bag.

Collection points are used where terrain is inaccessible or unsafe for trucks to empty bins from properties. Collection points are agreed to by affected residents and council.

Rubbish bin

Twice a year, we offer a special collection for your bundled branches, from January to March and then November to December.

These materials are important to dispose of as part of your preparation for the fire season.

- Branches should be tied so they can be safely and easily lifted by a person into the collection vehicle.
- Branches should be maximum of 1.5 meters in length and have a maximum diameter of 200mm.
- Tie branches less than 75mm in diameter into bundles using non-plastic string like jute twine (available from hardware stores).
- Tree limbs between 75-200mm in diameter can be placed individually straight, clean, with side branches removed.



- (X) Timber
- 💢 Stumps, roots, soil
- X Untied small branches
- X Large tree limbs
- ⊗ Branches with nails or wire
- Bamboo, creepers, vines, palm trees, soft plants, rose bushes, thorny plants, weeds, grass clippings, or leaves these can go into your FOGO bin.

If your bundled branches haven't been collected by the end of your collection week, please notify Council by 5pm on the following Friday at **1300 368 333**. Late notification will result in non-collection.

Place your bundled branches on the nature strip by Sunday evening at the start of your collection week, no more than one week in advance. If your bins are normally collected from a collection point, leave your bundled branches at that location.

Non-household properties such as businesses, schools and community groups are not eligible for bundled branch collections.

- Maximum 3 cubic meters of hard waste per household (except metal can be unlimited)
- Items no longer than 1.5m in length and a maximum of 50kg in weight.
- Please place your items out no more than one week before your collection week.
- If your bins are collected from a collection point, leave your hard waste at this location.
- Ensure clear access for collection vehicles during the collection week.
- Vacant blocks, properties without a bin collection, and non-residential properties such as businesses, schools and community groups are not eligible for a hard waste collection.

#### Items accepted for hard waste collection include:

#### Will be recycled

- TVs and computer's
- Mattresses
- E-waste items
- Metals, white goods (remove fridge doors)
- Bundled Branches.

#### Will go to landfill

- Window glass, mirror's, shower screens (must be wrapped and label as 'glass')
- Carpet (rolled)
- Furniture items
- Timber (up to 10 pieces, no fencing)
- Large household items too big for rubbish bin.

#### Items not accepted for hard waste collection include:

- Note: Industrial, business or commercial waste
- (X) Car batteries, tyres, suspension springs or engines
- Household rubbish or recyclables small enough to fit in your bin –
  place into your rubbish bin or recycling or collection
- Polystyrene
- Chemicals, liquids, paints, oil, fluids, gas cylinders, fuel, water tanks
- Bricks, rubble, excavated materials, concrete, soil, building renovation materials, lino, cement sheeting, asbestos
- 🚫 Dangerous items such as barbed wire or unwrapped/broken glass.

# How to dispose of items that can't go into your bins



#### **Electronic Waste (E-waste)**

Electronic waste (or 'e-waste') is any item with a power cord or battery.

E-waste cannot be placed into any bin. It can be disposed for free using your annual hard waste collection or taken to a waste transfer station for disposal (a small fee may apply).

#### Some examples of e-waste

In the kitchen - blender, toaster, kettle, electric knife, radio.

In the loungeroom – pedestal fan, remote control, playstation, light fittings.

In the kids' room - clock, talking toy, remote control car, tablet, reading light.

In the bathroom – electric toothbrush, electric shaver, hair dryer, hair straightener.



#### **Batteries**

Batteries should never be placed into your council bins, as they can start fires in collection trucks and leach harmful chemicals into the environment.

95% of battery components can be reused if recycled!

Batteries, including AAA, AA, C, D, 9V, laptop, phone and tool batteries can be taken to Aldi, Woolworths, Officeworks and Bunnings stores for recycling. #### **Detox Your Home**



Chemicals should never be placed into your rubbish bin or on your nature strip for hard rubbish collection.

Council and Sustainability Victoria partner each year to provide free 'Detox Your Home' collections for the safe disposal of household chemicals.

Detox Your Home accepts household cleaners, nail polish remover, fire extinguishers, garden fertilisers, herbicides, insect sprays, pool chemicals, coolant, machine oil and paint thinners.

Recovery and Waste Transfer Stations accept a range of items for recycling and disposal, including bulky items such as couches and white goods and many hazardous and difficult to recycle items. Fees apply for some items.

Some transfer stations have a second-hand goods store where items can be purchased for reuse.

All transfer stations within Yarra Ranges are privately operated facilities.
